Here at Bishop Kelly there are two sophomore girls who have been chosen to be foreign exchange students. Sophomores Kris Brown and Susan Peterson are awaiting an answer on which country they will be living in temporarily to attend school in their junior year.

Kris Brown is hoping to attend a school either in Switzerland or Japan. She says that the main reason she wants to be an exchange student is to see how other societies live. She applied for a number of countries and was interviewed first by teachers here at BK and then on a state level in Twin Falls. Eleven other students from Idaho were also chosen for the foreign exchange student program.

Kris has traveled to a number of foreign countries. She has been to New Zealand, Australia, and Figi, one of 300 islands in the south pacific. She has studied French and is intending to study German and Italian, which will benefit her in Switzerland.

Kris says she will leave in late July and is going to spend her entire junior year in a foreign land.

Susan Peterson has applied to be a foreign exchange student in either Switzerland, Australia, or Sweden. Susan thinks that being an exchange student would be a good experience.

The only foreign country Susan has been to is Canada. She is in her second year of Spanish, but when she knows which country she will be going to, she will study the appropriate language prior to her leaving.

Susan is not sure when she is leaving. If she is chosen for a country in the southern hemisphere, she will not be leaving until January, which is when their school year starts. If chosen for the northern hemisphere she will leave in July.

Both girls know that there will be several changes they will have to become accustomed to and have expressed strongly that they will miss their families and friends. They are planning to return for their senior year here at BK.

Boys' B-Ball Wins SRV Conference

The Knights will play tomorrow night at Montgomery field house in Caldwell for the district championship. If the Knights win district, they will go to the state tournament in Coeur d'Alene.

After a victory of 76-54 over Middleton last Saturday, the Knights wrapped up the regular season as the S.R.V. conference champs. The Knights finished the regulation season play with a record of 15-4 and a conference record of 9-3. The Knights won the S.R.V. conference by one game over Emmett whose record was 8-4.

The Knights averaged 63 points per game. The leading scorers for the season have been seniors Scott McGrath who is averaging 15 pts. per game and Scott Lawrence who has a 12 point per game average. McGrath and Lawrence are also the teams leading rebounders.

However, Coach Fritz feels that everyone on the team is a very important player. Senior Nick Brady and juniors Tom Heffner and Andy Gustavsen make up the rest of the starting team. Brady and Heffner average 8 points per game and Gustavsen averages 6 points and has many rebounds. The rest of the team consists of seniors: Dave Grapp, Tim Griffis, Paul Fritz, Mark Goicochea and junior Pat Shalz.

Right To Lifers Rally At Capitol

On January 22 on the steps of the Statehouse the Idaho Right to Life Society held its annual rally. According to Mr. Henry Krewer, President of the Idaho Right to Life Society and science teacher at Bishop Kelly, the rally's purpose was to remember the 8,000,000 lives that have been destroyed by abortion in the United States since the Supreme Court's abortion decision in 1973.

Mrs. Krewer, a housewife, and a Boise State University student were among those who spoke out against the fact that abortion can legally be performed at any time during the nine months of pregnancy. There were approximately 200 people in attendance at the rally. According to Mr. Krewer, the Idaho Right to Life Society will continue to hold the services each year until a Human Life Amendment is passed through Congress.

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
