Tuition Costs Rise; Student Combat Problem

"Bishop Kelly is having a tuition increase for the 1982-83 school year," according to Mrs. Cowley, school bookkeeper.

The tuition for tamilies in Boise and Meridian parishes is going from \$850 to \$950 for the first child, from \$550 to \$650 for the second, and from \$350 to \$400 for the third. For families outside the Boise and Meridian parishes, the tuition is going from \$1000 to \$1100 for the first child and from \$850 to 950 for the second. Students Cited For Drinking; **Keg Party Not Prevented**

Three weeks ago a senior student at BK had a party. Alcohol was present at this party and the police showed up. Several students, a majority of which go to BK, were issued juvenile warnings and illegal consumption tickets.

The students that received juvenile warnings got these because they were minors that were present at a party where the consumption of alcohol was taking place. The students that received illegal consumption citations were for the actual consumption of alcohol.

After the citations and warnings were distributed, the police instructed all those concerned to leave the house. However, the police let students that were issued illegal consumption tickets drive other students home. If the police would have considered the possible threat to the students and to the innocent people on the road, they would have regulated the situation.

One policeman acknowledged that the police were notified of the party and ot the keg earlier the same day at 3:00 p.m. The party began at 7:30 p.m. that night. Therefore the police could have detoured the situation earlier and avoided all infringements of the law.

The police waited until the party was in its third hour before they intruded. This allowed more time for the students to come to the party, therefore the police were able to write out more tickets and receive more ticket revenue. The fine for an illegal consumption is fifty dollars plus court costs.

It was wrong on the part of the students to illegally drink. However, it was irresponsible of the Boise police to let the drunk students drive home and endanger the lives of other drivers on the road.


Saturday morning, the group started to pack for their departure from the city. They attended an awards presentation given for the people that won awards in the write-off contests.

They arrived in Boise at 7:45 p.m., and were greeted by a couple of students from Bishop Kelly. They all had a good time and wished that the convention had never






For him, the river represents everything nature has to offer, and as opposed to the wide-open panoramic views one gets backpacking, rafting offers a closer, more personal experience with nature. He feels the river is an extension of himself. He is dependent on it, yet is a little afraid of the possible danger. Smith says that although he recognizes all the possible dangers and the slim chance he has of continuing his almost flawless record of successful journeys, he could never drown or die as a result of the water. "Water is my second nature," he says, "and I just don't see the possibility of any harm coming to me while I'm in it."


Smith helps waylay the possibility of an accident by building and maintaining his own equipment. The raft consists of three metal tube frame, and the purchased rubber raft. Mr. Smith has had the same rubber raft for close to ten years only because he puts eight to nine hours of repair work into it after every excursion. The metal frame doesn't have such a good life expectancy. Sometimes he has to build one every summer because the old ones are bent, broken, and beyond bandaging. He now has two rafts he shares with his father and brothers and has accumulated several other vital pieces of equipment that people have donated to his raft over the years.

Smith has managed to secure two hardto-come-by permits for floating the River of No Return (the same one the prez was on) and the Main Fork of the Salmon River, but his dream is to somehow obtain a permit to float the Grand Canyon River in Colorado. "I've been trying, and all my friends have been trying, to get a permit since I was a senior in college and I still can't get one," he sighs. He said close to half a million people apply for the permit from all over the continent and only 13,000 are able to secure one.

Mr. Smith takes people down the river for no fee but the floatees must pay for food and gas and do all the menial labor. "I'm the cook and the oarsman, that's all I do," he stated. "I do it for the sheer enjoyment of it, not for a job."
