When the flab starts gathering in unwanted places, and the mirror gets blamed for exaggerating the spare tire around the waist, people long to go on a CRASH diet. Of course, this shaping up will take a much longer time than it appears to in the former diet. But at least the effects will be long lasting.

If the previous proposal does not suit, then the final suggestion is to indulge in some kind of regular exercise. Otherwise a person should be satisfied with being pleasantly plump.

After talking to several people from each class I discovered each person has their own ideas about what next year holds for them.

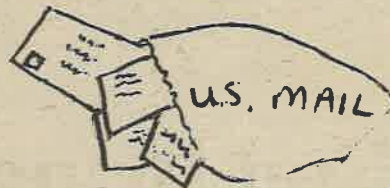

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Class Of '81 Reviews Class Of '65

What Really Happened to the Class of 1965, a novel by Mike Medved and David Wallechinsky, is a review of the 60's and its aftermath, yet is nothing like a history book. Through interviews and short summaries of 30 of the authors' classmates, including themselves, the book combines personal history and social happenings to produce a clear view of the effects of society and the era in regard to the people who grew up in it.

In 1965, Time Magazine did a feature story about the senior class of Pacific Palisades High School. They called the article "Today's Teenager" and described the students as being on the "fringe of a golden era." Little did they know at the time, that these seniors would be the people who lived through Vietnam, the drug culture, and movements and revolts of all kinds. The Students at "Pali High" were

the affluent and famous sons and daughters of Hollywood stars and wealthy businessmen. They led sheltered lives and really experienced the events of the tumultuous '60's that we all read about. From the team quarterback to the class bookworm, the authors give insight into these same students, the people who lived during the heart of the 60's, and played a major role in today's outlook about morals, sex and life in general.

The book is really easy to read, and is quite interesting at this time of year, in comparison to the graduating class of 1981. The Class of '65 didn't know that they were living in such a major influential age, and the Class of 1981 is just as clueless.

Through the characters, who came from the same basic background, the reader is shown all the failures and achievements of the

graduates during the years from '65 until '75, at their class' 10 year reunion, and each student seems to depict a good or bad factor developed in the 1960's.

This book was interesting because it gave a little insight into some of the real people problems that existed in the 60's without being overly narrow. By interviewing 30 people, the authors give a well rounded view and don't preach on one thing, like drug abuse.

The reader can see the students and their problems of coping in a drifting society, with no set morals or direction. These students make up the divorce statistics, the casualties from Vietnam, and the people with drug problems. The 1960's was a time of experimenting, and these students all experimented in some way or another. They were used to wealth, and today, as adults, suffer from the inflation that can be

traced to the postwar problems of the economy. They had all they ever wanted, and today some of them struggle to feed their families.

It is a view of the authors' feelings about the wandering society they lived in, and the problems they are now experiencing because of the pleasures they supposedly experienced directly out of high school, the benefits of "the golden era."

The book doesn't dwell on the negative aspects of peoples' lives. Medved himself suggests a sequel in another 10 years; because people continue to search and work toward their goals and happiness, and people will probably be quite different later than they are today. It is like reading 30 small autobiographies, and brings up the interesting question of where our fellow classmates will be in 10 years, and how big of a chapter the 80's will get in the history books.

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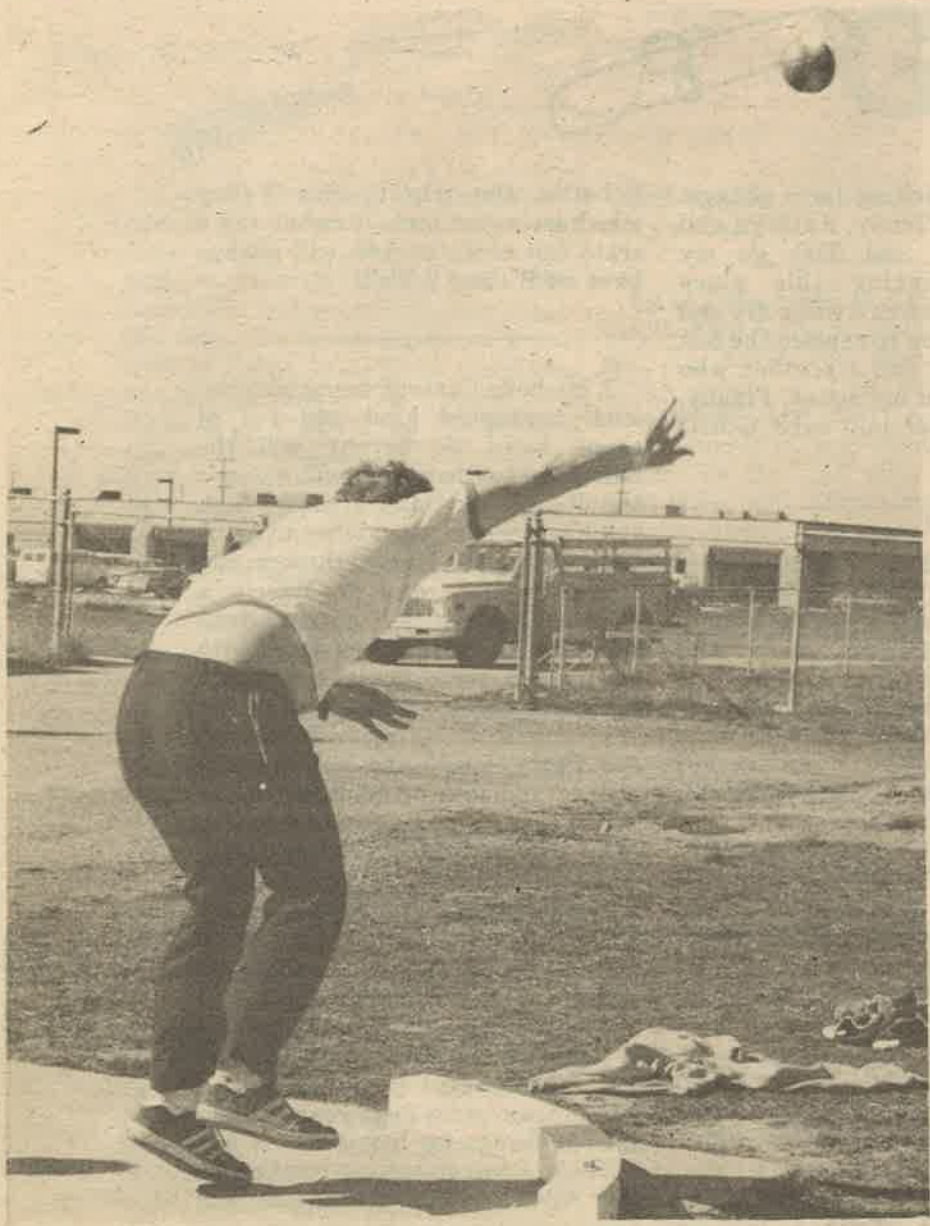

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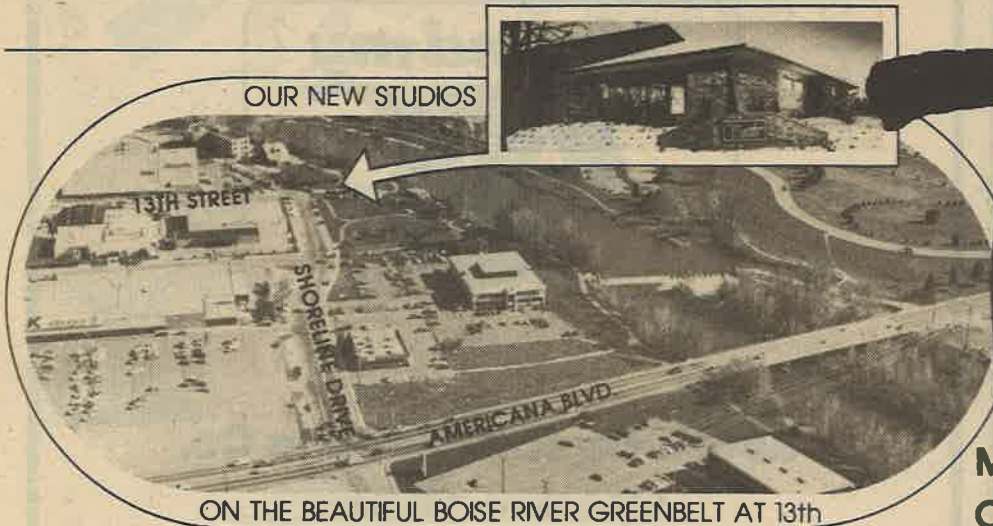
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
