

Draw The Line Between Straight News And Slanted

Sunday, November 9, the Idaho Statesman, a local newspaper, published an article about teenage sex entitled, "Sexual freedom attracts, troubles Idaho teens." Written directly under this headline was the following:

EDITOR'S NOTE: Some teenagers quoted in the stories on this page are identified with first names only. Those names are fictional to conceal their identity.

There are four Bishop Kelly students who were interviewed for this article, one with a full name revealed and another had her first name written.

Senior, Mary Florence, was one of the four BK students used in the article. She said that the interviewer told the girls twice that their names would not be revealed, "once when we walked in (for the interview) and he checked over our names again and told us, 'You don't have to worry, because I won't use any names at all. If I use any names, they won't be yours. The students were mislead to think that their names would not be mentioned. Yet Mary's full name was written in the article along with a quote. There were also two other teenagers with their full names written in the article.

The BK students talked together when the interview was over and decided, stated Mary, that "He (the interviewer) had the whole article written in his mind before he interviewed us. He didn't need us; he just picked out the few comments that would support his point and he left out the really important ones. I felt like I said a lot more important things than what he used in the article." According to Mary, her quote about bad girls was taken out of context. "Prejudging someone on their reputation is unfair. He left out that I said it was unfair. And it sounded like I was condemning people with bad reputations."

The article showed many implications that most teenagers are sex that the majority of their friends are not sexually active. The next question asked was, "Where do the guys from Bishop Kelly go to get it?" The answer to that was, "You are so ignorant. That's a typical thing for an adult to say."

Whenever a Catholic girl was Quoted in the article, she was often referred to as such. No other persons were referred to as Baptist, Jewish, black or five feet-six and one half inches.

Another article was written on the same page as this article. This article was about sex education in the schools. The opening paragraph described a health and science teacher at a Catholic high school in Idaho. There is only one Catholic high school in the state of Idaho. The article goes on to say that this teacher brought in a Planned Parenthood program for his classes. The next sentence said that his contract was not renewed for the next year. This is an implication that the teacher was fired because he brought in Planned Parenthood into his classes. Father Wilson, Principal of BK, said, "That was not the factor, was not discussed, was not considered. That was an isolated incident and was in no way connected in the teacher not being re-hired."

As a journalism student I feel it is important for the professional journalists who are protected by the First Amendment to write according to the ethics of journalism which is to report the facts without implication that would misguide the reader.

New Wave Hits The Scene

What at first appeared to be just a passing fad in today's music is starting to become accepted in Boise, if not, at Bishop Kelly.

New Wave music, as it is called, is becoming popular in other schools in the city, but here at BK it is just now gaining acceptance.

One Bishop Kelly student who is into the New Wave sound is senior Michelle Cantrill. She believes that if people at Bishop Kelly would just listen to it and give it a chance, New Wave music would become as popular here as it is at Boise High where apparently it has reached epidemic proportions.

Senior Mark Hopfenbeck, a man of unquestionable taste, is evidence to Michelle's conclusion. "Once you start listening to it you begin to like it," said Hopfenbeck. He also added that the local radio stations need to play more New Wave music in a greater variety before it will become very popular.

People listen to the Cars on the radio and just think of them as an ordinary rock-n-roll band but according to Michelle, the Cars are one of the leading groups in the New Wave move.

She was also quick to point out that there is a big difference be-

tween new wave and punk music. Punk music is typically violent and rebellious and the music is often harsh and discordant. New Wave however is characterized by a back to the basics approach with a lot of harmonization. Michelle made comparisons between the music typical of new wave groups and the music of the 50's and 60's especially that of groups like the Beatles. Although acts such as Blondie, Gary Neuman and the Clash have become popular at Bishop Kelly, people don't think of them as New Wave bands. They really are. It appears that people aren't willing to give a group a chance if they come under the label "New Wave."

"I feel that the people at Bishop Kelly are narrow minded and don't give it a chance," said senior Jenny Reilly. "I think that if they would give it a chance they would really like it," she added.

Many of the under classmen are heavily into the New Wave, and that could be a sign that New Wave is on its way up at BK.

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Brett Van Paepeghem; Youngest Nationals Winner

Brett Van Paepeghem, a junior at BK, is a professional drag racer.

Brett started drag racing two years ago when he was fifteen. However, he has wanted to race ever since he was in third grade. Brett's motivation to race basically came from his father. He feels that if it were not for his father's extreme interest in the sport, he would probably have never dreamed of doing it.

Brett races in a western coast circuit. He has raced in such places as Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle and even in Canada. Brett drives a 1967 Camero when he races.

Brett has raced in many competitions. At the age of 15, he raced in the Brateter Nationals and won. Brett currently has the record for the youngest winner of the race. At that race, Brett won a purse of \$2400. His other accomplishments include, being runner-up at a national competition with a \$1000 purse.

However, Brett is not the only winner in his household. His father won the superstock drag racing competition two different times.

Brett stated that he has never gotten hurt or even into an accident.

Brett explained that drag racing is divided into two categories: the super stock division and the stock division. Each of them corresponds to the different types of cars used. The actual race consists of two drivers, a starting light and a quarter-mile track.

The main skill of the sport is the driver's quickness as he leaves the starting gate, and his approximation of the time it will take him to reach the finish. If a driver finishes the race in less time than he predicted that driver is disqualified.

Brett's fastest time on the track is 12 seconds, accelerating to a top speed of 120 miles per hour.

Brett stated that racing is really only one-half of the actual sport. The other half consists of the driver's preparation and care of his car. Brett works on his car for about two weeks before he has a race.

Brett plans to race for as long as possible. However, he also adds, if you don't win (money) the financial burden of traveling and maintaining your car would be very hard to cope with."

Brett recommends the sport to anyone interested in racing and with the determination to practice a lot.



Carla Hammond; Bishop Kelly's Own Rodeo Queen

Since Bishop Kelly is located in a big city like Boise, many of its students have not had the opportunity to experience life of the rodeo. There is a girl in the junior class though, who has participated

Other impressive titles include: Idaho Girls Rodeo Association all around cowgirl 1980, and Gem State Reserve all around cowgirl 1980. The prizes she has won include a saddle worth a lot of money, and numerous belt-buckles. Competing for money, Carla has won over 400 dollars from various rodeos. When

asked how she got started in rodeos,

Carla commented, "Well, I've lived on a ranch all my life with horses

and I grew to love them. Also my Dad used to rodeo and he taught me

how to rope and ride. I would just practice while I was working and



The 1980 Girls Varsity and Junior Varsity basketball teams are looking forward to a very good season this year. Both teams have new coaches and new players which will be to their advantage.

The Varsity is being coached by Joe Bauman who coached the Junior Varsity team last year. He teaches at St. Mary's, and his years of coaching basketball will greatly benefit the team.

This year, the Varsity consists of only nine players. There are four returning players, seniors Julie Harrington, Debbie Diaz and Pam Richardson and junior Carla Hammond. Coach Bauman feels the team's only weakness is its shortage of players. Because there are only nine players, there will be difficulty in scrimages with one side minus a player. However, Bauman feels that this will not hurt the team in any way during games.

Coach Bauman feels that the strengths will be many. "There will be an overall team spirit, good experience and a good solid quality bench." Bauman said. He added that the emphasis will be put on defense, and that the team will be strongly defensive oriented.

The competition the team will face this year will be mostly from the A-1 schools, and possibly from Kuna, an A-2 school. Bauman emphasized the fact that the team will not have to rely on just one or two people to do all the scoring or all the rebounding. It will be a total team effort consisting of good quality players working together as one team

This year's goals for the team will be to participate in the State Tournament which will be held at Boise High School. Another goal will be to win the league. The team will play eighteen games in all.

New to the regular season this year will be a Christmas Tournament to be held here in the city. The tourney will be held the twentyninth and thirtieth of December.

Heading the Junior Varsity team this year will be Miss Janice Taylor with help from Joe Bauman as her assistant.

The team consists of fifteen players, and should be one of the best teams ever to hit Kelly, according to Bauman. Bauman said that the returning sophomores will be leading the team. He also added that there will be an excellent back-up from the freshman. Bauman stated that this will probably be the best group of freshmen girls that have ever been here at Kelly.

Strengths for the team include quickness and a good team effort on the whole. Bauman emphasized that the team will also be defensively oriented.

The team should be very competitive compared with the rest of the league. The entire league is equally balanced this year, making the competition level equal also.

The season for the Varsity and J.V. will open November fourteenth against Borah, J.V. games begin at 6:15 followed by the Varsity at 8:00. The team would appreciate the support of the school at as many games as possible.

Drill Team Practices For Basketball Season


Drill Team practices have started and the 36 girls on the team are polishing their drills for the basketball season.

Veteran Runner Breaks Course Record By Nine Seconds

Ellen Lyons, a 1980 graduate of Bishop Kelly, ran in the national cross country meet in Seattle, WA Saturday, November 15. Ellen


