Enrollment Down

There appear to be less students walking the halls this year. Last year there were 420 students attending Bishop Kelly. This year there are 400, according to BK enrollment statistics.

"I think one of the reasons for the smaller enrollment is because of last years small 8th grade classes at the parochial schools," according to Judy Kross, vice-principal. The freshmen class has approximately 95 students compared with last years freshman class of about 118 students.

"Ninety-five students is about average for a graduating class. If we can keep this number at about the same, then this class will be average," says Mrs. Kross.

"Every year we lose students by the normal attrition rate. This is caused by students moving away or sometimes transferring to another school. This is something which we have no control over. However, to make up for that we also have students come to our school because of a move or a transfer. I hope that this class can keep up approximately ninety-five students because that is about the average size of a graduating class," Kroos said.

Even though lower enrollment could mean better understanding for the students and teachers there are still problems, financially. Enrollment is the financial situation. There isn't any cause for alarm in lower enrollment, the only problem is that it makes it dif-

ficult financially when you try to budget the costs with less students than expected," Kroos stated.

Mr. Fritz, dean of students, also thinks that another cause of low enrollment might be because of the higher tuition. Last year tuition for a catholic student in Boise was \$750. This year it is \$850.

Girls Admitted To Key Club

The Key Club has devoted this year to service projects for the school and community. They are rejuvenating the Marquis sign in front of the school by repainting it and replacing the gutters where the letters are placed.

The club is starting a drive for goods to be given to a poor family. Members will help unload merchandise for an auction at the Red Lion motel. The Key Club will assist and dance with senior citizens at the Annual Holiday Ball.

This is the first year that girls have been admitted into Key Club. Junior Eric LaMott says that "Girls have added a new dimension to Key Club."

Key Club looks forward to more service projects in the future.

Is Powderpuff Too Tough?

Powderpuff football has been a tradition here at Kelly for years. However, this year there has been quite a bit of controversy concerning the girls and the game.

Every year during Homecoming the girls athletic association or G.A.A. sponsors a football game for girls only. This year just as every year seniors, juniors sophmores and even freshmen will participate. This year, however, a lot of the girls have decided not to play for various reasons.

When asked why she wasn't playing, Kandi Hague said, "All the rules spoil the fun."

The girls were responsible for filling out permission slips in order to play in case of injuries. The privelege of wearing the guys varsity jerseys was taken away, a limited number of coaches for each team was set and restrictions were put on the time limit of the game. Each quarter will be ten running minutes and there will be a ten minute half time.

Dean of students, Mr. Fritz stated that the reason for these restrictions was to cut out some of the injuries to the girls.

"I would hate to see something like that happen. It is for this reason also that some of the other schools in Boise decided to do away with it," Fritz said.

Lane Quinley, G.A.A. moderator, felt that the powderpuff game was a way for the girls to get involved and if they didn't play they would show that lack of school pride and spirit shown at Homecoming time. However, Maria-Iglesias stated that because the game is held only once a year, there shouldn't have to be any restrictions and she also stated that she didn't blame any of the seniors for not playing.

It is unfortunate that the rules should have to be so restricted. However, the girls should keep in mind that these rules are for their own benefit, to help prevent injuries. There is a way for the girls to show their disapproval, but boycotting is not a solution. Boycotting is only a way to rid BK of the powderpuff game forever which is exactly what they are trying to avoid.

Ultravox Rages, Squier Says Don't Say No! Journey Escapes Devo

(3 stars)

Like a breath of fresh air, the Rolling Stones have come out with their best album since *Some Girls*. *Tattoo You* has brought Stones fans alive again, successfully combining rhythm and blues with rock, they have solidified their image as an innovative band who imitates no one. Side one punches out some good music with *Start Me Up* and *Little T & A*, while side two goes more into rhythm and blues. A fine album, but still a little short of their classics from earlier years.

Ultravox - Rage In Eden
(2½ stars)

A group that is relatively new to the American market, this electronic/new wave band from London Sounds a lot like Gary Numan, only with better vocals. Only their newest album, *Rage in Eden*, with the help of MTV, has gained them moderate sales in the U.S.

Unfortunately, it's a disappointing album, not meeting up to the standards they set for themselves with their previous LP, *Vienna*, a startling album which is deserving of praise. Unlike *Vienna*, *Rage in Eden* does not produce the audio effects combined with good lyrics and vocals. Even though the album is very listenable, it doesn't show the capabilities of a truly excellent band that should be popular in the U.S. soon.

Billy Squier - Don't Say No
(4 stars)

It's a pleasure to bring attention to this album which has gone neglected so far. Billy Squier's *Don't Say No* is the most awesome album to come out since Boston's first. Squier, in his third album to date, has achieved something not many LP's do, in bringing rousing heavy metal music into control and giving it a melodic sound. *In The Dark*, *The Stroke*, and *My Kinda Lover* are all mesmerizing, moderately paced

songs. These songs are all on the charts, suggesting mass appeal.

This album is definitely a killer, worthy of being called a classic. If you want to buy an album that everyone will like, buy *Don't Say No*.

Devo - New Traditionalists
(2 stars)

It seems that DEVO realizes that the more commercial their music is, the better they will sell, not giving any thought to quality. DEVO goes all out on their new release, *New Traditionalists*, offering a bonus single 45, a ridiculous cartoon poster, and their famous mail order sheet with a whole new line of DEVO products.

DEVO comes across an artificial band, pretending to have a cause behind their music, when their chief motive is greed. Whip It, a single that went big to make DEVO popular, was written entirely to catch the teen market as a cute bubble gum type song.

New Traditionalists is more of the same. Although a couple of songs, *Through Being Cool* and *Going Under* are well written and performed, this collection of commercial sop is best left in the record shop.

Journey - Escape
(3½ stars)

Journey is another band to get back on track with their latest release, *Escape*. This is Journey's best album since *Infinity*, which was three records ago. You can't say enough about this great band. On *Escape*, they show that they can rock with the best with songs like *Don't Stop Believing* and the title track, and yet they produce beautiful ballads such as *Who's Crying Now* and *Open Arms*. Steve Perry is one of the best vocalists in the rock world, and the band's harmony is second to none. Journey is truly the band of the 80's, and *Escape* is one of the best albums of the year.

Ouija Board Makes Appearance At Kelly

Many students have recently become interested with Ouija boards.

A Ouija board consists of the letters of the alphabet and numerals from zero to nine. The upper right-hand side has the word "yes" printed on it and the left-hand side has the word "no" on it. The letters or numerals are indicated by a pointer. The pointer is generally plastic and in an oval shape.

The device is supposed to be used by two people, preferably by two people of the opposite sex: The operators place their fingers on the sides of the pointer, and the participants hands are supposedly guided by the pointer which indicates letters or numerals which, in turn, produce words or messages.

The game was initially created by

French gypsies in 600 B.C. Its purpose was to foretell the future. The name Ouija was derived from the word "oui" which translates to yes in English from French, and from the work "ja" which means "yes" in German.

The operators of the board were considered and still are considered in some religious circles, as mediums, which obtain the messages from the board and from supernatural spirits. The spirits work through the people mediums, causing them to make messages unconsciously.

Some of these messages have become documented as being of a wholesome nature, while others have been of evil, according to Dr. Hobart E. Freeman the author of the book "Every Wind of Doctrine". Freeman also accounts certain

things as demonic possessions, crazed hysteria and even suicidal attempts of the operators of the device.

Fr. Dogdson, Department Head in Religion at BK, feels that the game is safe if it is treated as a joke. However, he also stated that believing what the messages reveal is wrong because it can lead to some serious mental and spiritual disorders.

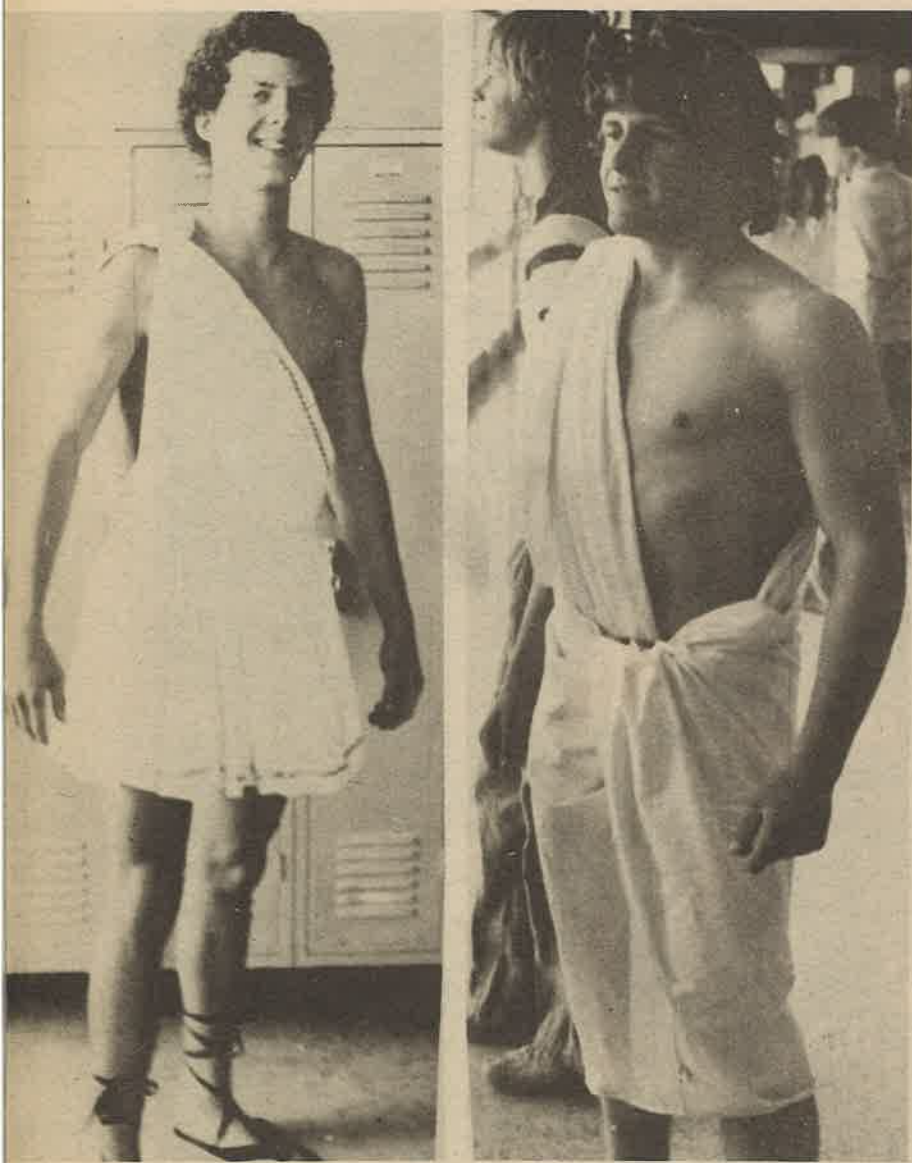

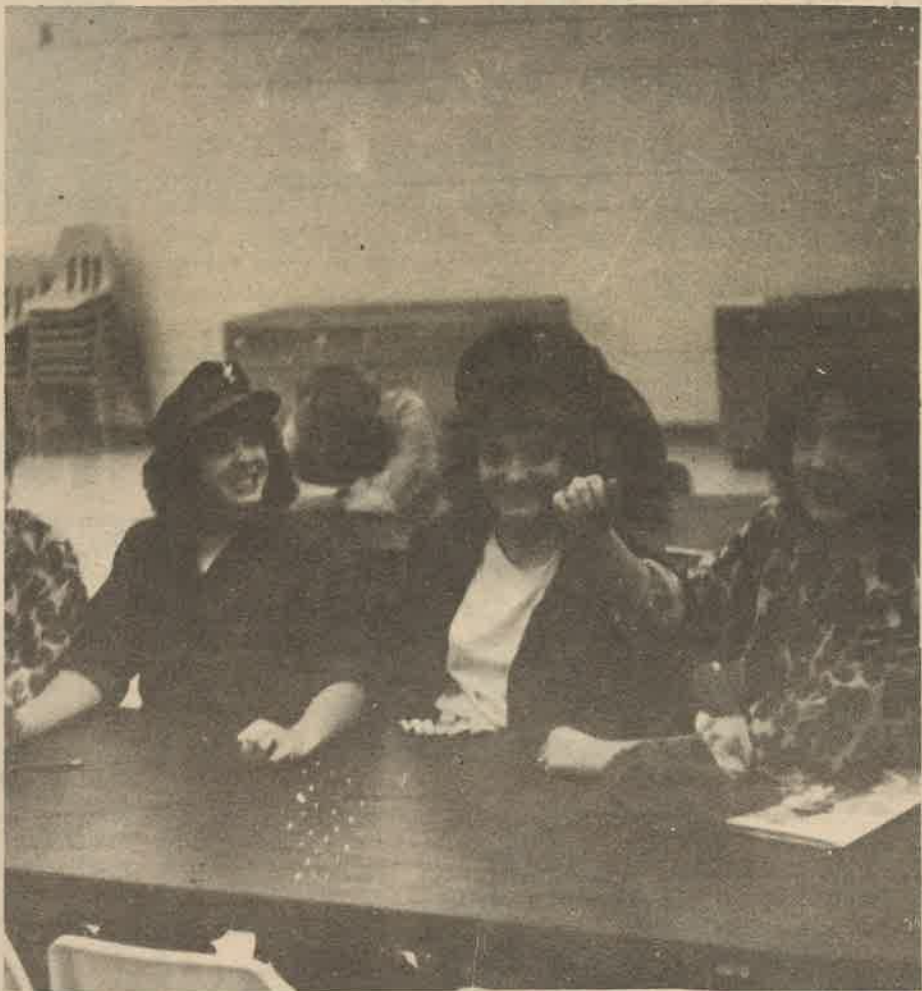

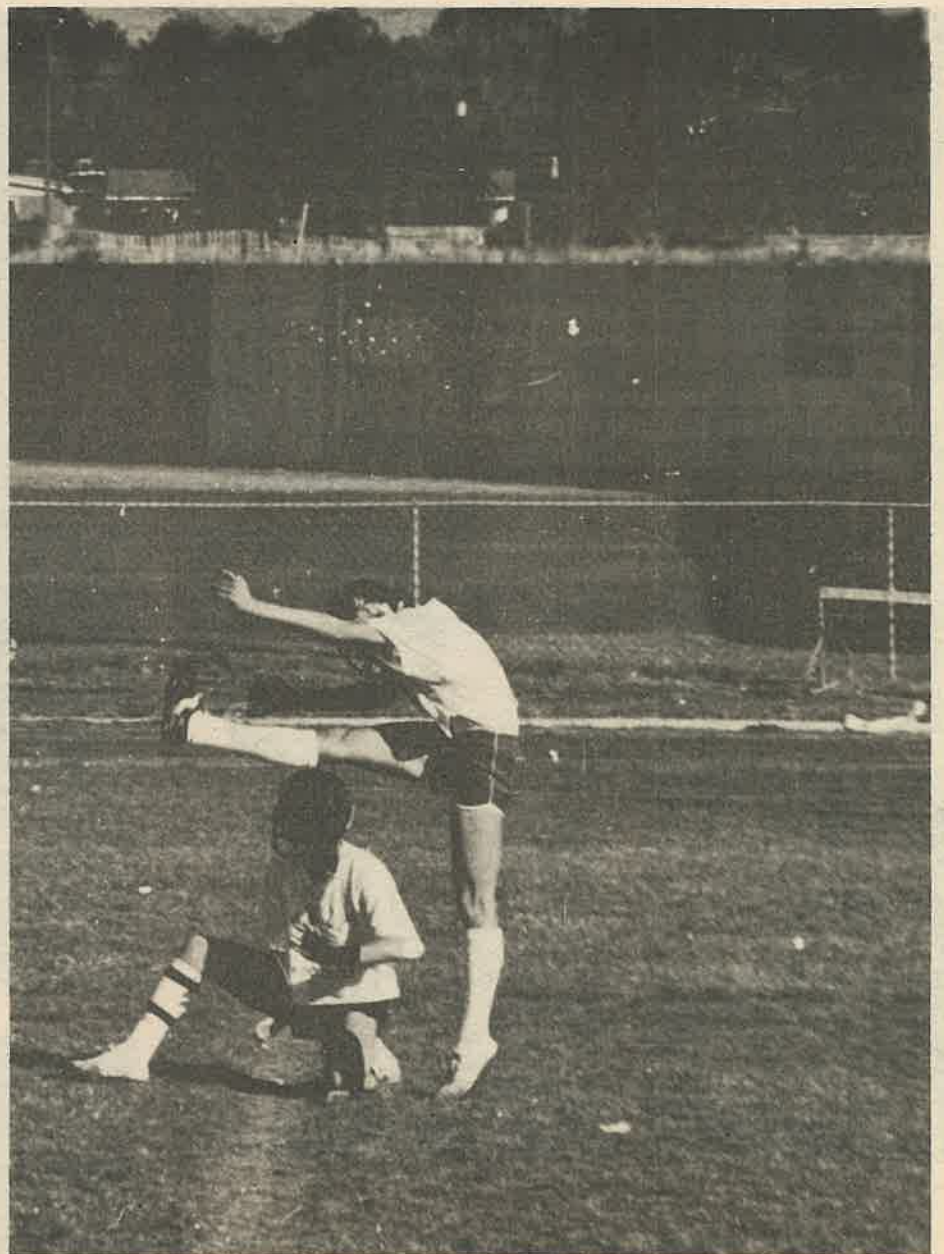

Equestrian Talents Displayed By BK'ers

There are two students at Bishop Kelly this year who compete in horseback events. Carla Hammond, a senior, competes in various rodeos throughout the year. Charlotte King, a freshman, competes in English riding events and has been doing so for six years.

Carla is a member of the Idaho Girl's Rodeo Association. She has entered in rodeos ever since she could ride a horse. Carla's father rode in rodeos and Carla has followed in his footsteps. For the last two years she has gone to the nationals in her sport. Carla just recently won the all around awards for her competition in the IGRA.

In rodeo events, there are five different competitions that the participants may enter. In the barrels and the poles, she must weave her horse around obstacles in as little time as possible. In breakaway and team roping she must lasso young steers and in the goat event she races the length of the arena and ties up a goat. This event Carla has won in both of her trips to the nationals. Included in the prizes are belt buckles, saddles and various amounts of cash.

Charlotte began English riding when she was nine, a year after she got her first horse. She is the only

member of her family that competes in English riding. Charlotte has been successful in her brief career so far. In 1979 she won the 13 and under Green Hunter State Championship and has won the State championship and has won the form and suitability of the horse and arena so the judges can evaluate the trans ride patterns around a flat day eventing. Charlotte has dreams of trying out for the Olympic team in her sport. She hopes to win a scholarship and go to a riding college where she can excel even further at English riding.

The Bishop Kelly "Mini-Knight" football program provides parochial 7th and 8th grade students the opportunity to play in an organized sports competition. The "Mini-Knights" have been drawn from all three parochial schools for the past several years, and for the first time this year include a team member from St. Mark's parish. The season schedule pits the team against units from far larger schools such as Meridian, Lowell, Scott, Mt. Home, Nampa West and South, and Lake Hazel. Thus far into the year the team has claimed one win to three very close losses.

Coch Dave Wargo, in his third year at the position, is pleased with his players performances. "The Mini-Knight team is built on a twenty player

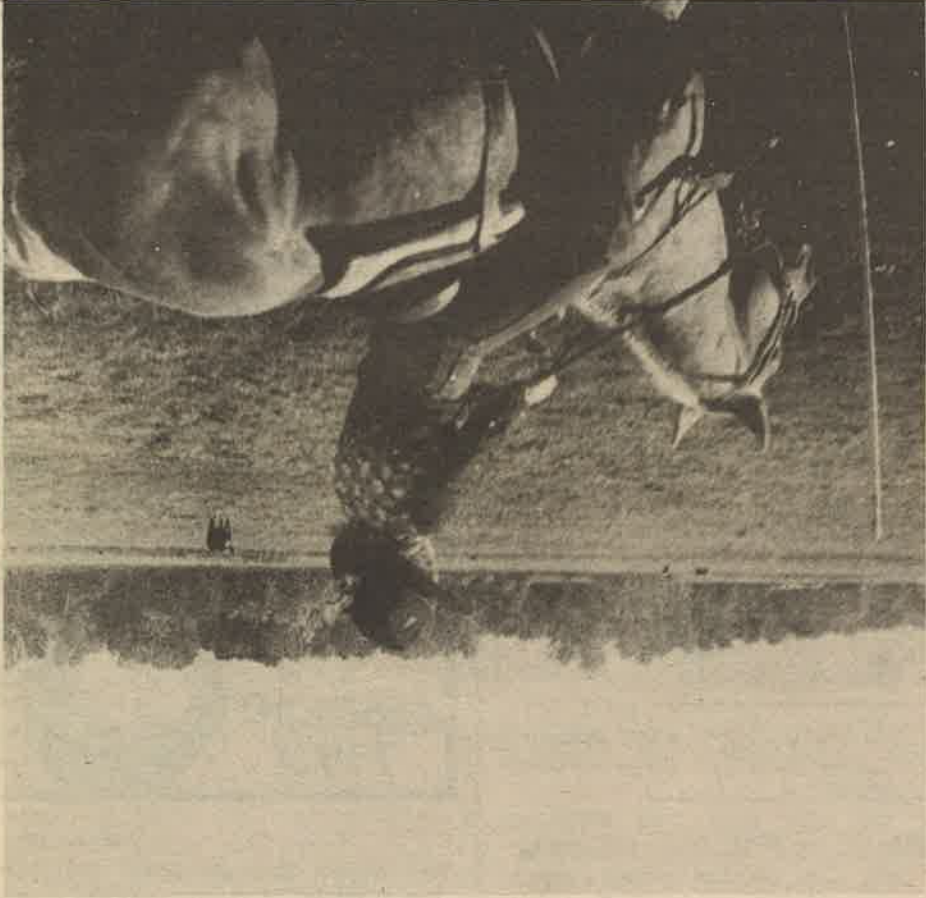
