Student Council cancels dance

Votes in Mock Election

On Monday, October 13, the students of Bishop Kelly voted on the presidential and Idaho Senatorial races. The ballots were taken during activity period in room four. The election was run by the Journalism class. The election was voluntary, with about 50% eligible voters showing up. The ballots in-

cluded the names of the four presidential candidates: John Anderson, Jimmy Carter, Ed Clark and Ronald Reagan. It also included Steve Symms and Frank Church, the two men running for the Idaho Senate seat. There also was a, "Why did you vote this way?" question on the ballot.

Reagan was the winner of the Presidential race with 107 votes. Most of the comments made about him were positive. Students felt that he would be a strong leader and he would put the U.S. back on our feet economically and militarily. However, some felt that Reagan could cause a war.

Anderson was the runner-up, (contrary to the gallop polls) with 73 of the votes. Most felt that he would be a good medium between Carter and Reagan.

Carter came in third place with 39 votes. Most comments about him

were negative. Many students were fed up with his foreign policy and poor economics, but some felt that he was the best experienced can-

Clark came in last place with 13 votes. Most that voted for Clark felt that the government controlled society too much and that he would change that.

In the Idaho Senatorial race, Church was the winner with 121 votes. Students felt that he was the best for Idaho and that he would best represent Idaho's people. The only bad comments about Church were on his decision on the issue of abortion. The comments were that

Church is pro abortion, but this is not true. Frank Church is pro choice, not pro abortion.

Symms had 90 votes. Some felt that Symms represented a change for Idaho. His main faults were that he lacked experience, and that he had a poor congressional voting

Alltogether, the poll represented a positive effort on the part of the students to express their views on a very important election. Most of the students are not yet old enough to vote, but the issues and decisions that the candidates represent may greatly change our lives.

If you were one of the many people who sat down low in your seat and could not control your scream at the end of the movie, "Carrie," The Dead Zone will have you anxiously flipping pages. "Carrie" was based on a novel by Stephen King, who is the author if The Dead Zone.

Similar to King's other novels, The Fire Starter and Carrie, the Dead Zone is an eerie story that follows a character's life, which is not typical of your average acquaintances.


During vacations and school breaks the vans are kept out of sight because of the possibility of vandalism. This summer a window was broken out of the brown van.

Kelly Varsity Ends Season Against Kaveme

The Bishop Kelly Knights traveled to Kuna for the final game of the 1980 season last week. After a scoreless first quarter, both teams continued to play solid defense, when, with 13 seconds left, Kuna scored on a four yard pass. The extra point was good and the Kavemen took a 7-0 lead into half-time.

The Knights allowed two more touchdowns in the third quarter and fell behind 21-0. However, the Kelly offense continued to drive and finally scored with 55 seconds left in the game. Junior quarterback Pat Shalz ran 15 yards into the Kuna endzone to shatter the Kavemen shutout.

Senior tailback Chris Compton led the Knights' ground game with 91 yards on 16 carries.

Junior Larry Crump added the extra-point, but the Kuna won the game 21-7.

Compton, who came back from a knee injury incurred two weeks ago against Payette, was also the leading rusher in that game with 15 tries for 148 yards.

The Knights beat Payette 38-2 in their final home game of the season. After a slow first half the Knights held a 10-2 lead, but exploded for a 28 point second half for a convincing Homecoming victory.

Junior Larry Crump put the Knights up 3-0 when he booted a 32 yard field goal in the first quarter. On the kick-off that followed, Senior Dion Davies recovered a Payette fumble which led to Kelly's first touchdown of the game. Junior Pat Shalz hit Senior Nick Brady on a 12 yard pass and to put the Knights up 10-0. Crump added the PAT.

A bad snap on a Kelly punt went out of the end zone to give Payette a safety.

The Knights came back in the second half and quickly began to put the points on the scoreboard. Brady caught another TD pass, this time from junior flanker Tom Heffner and another extra point was tacked on by Crump.

Sophomore Mike Henry scored two touchdowns, once from the 1-yard line and then from the 9. Called in to kick the extra point was Chris Compton who drop-kicked the ball through the uprights to give the Knights a 31-2 edge.

Shalz returned a Payette Punt 54 yards for the only score of the fourth quarter and a 38-2 victory.

The Knights offense rolled for 200 yards on the ground and added 94 through the air.

most successful coach in the SRV last year, said that they should have


a good team. "I don't know if we can match last year's team, but we
