Most Distinguished Kelligian Of the Year

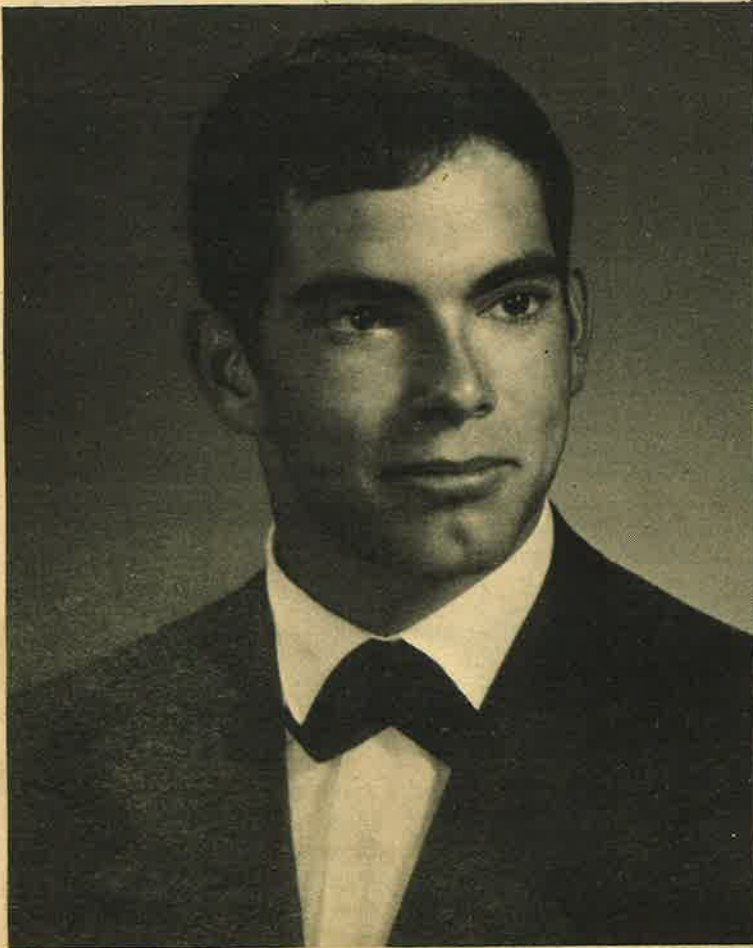

Jeanne was also General Chairman of the Senior Assembly. To make her Senior year very memorable, Jeanne was honored as Salutatorian.

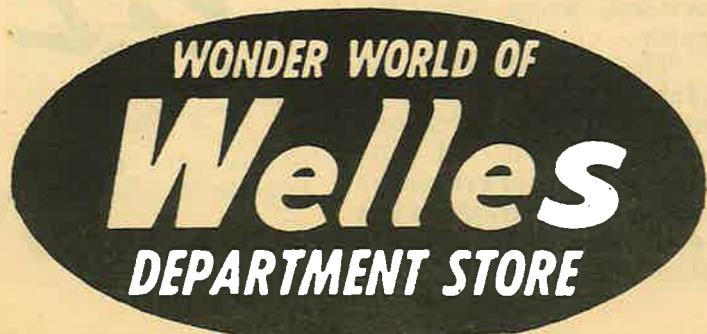

A great example of enthusiasm was displayed by Alta Welsh who always tried her hardest to make the Troopadors the best.

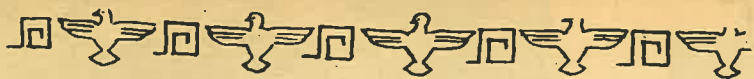
The foursome of Foldger, Larkin, Lange and Herold stuck together through glory, and misery.

The sorrow of your leaving we cannot tell.

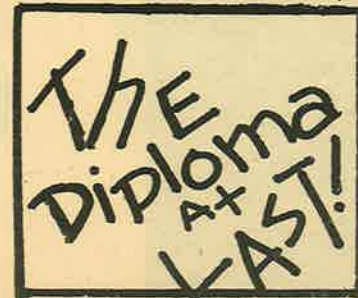

Girl Senior of the Year

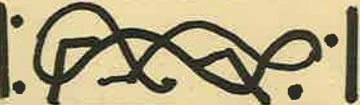

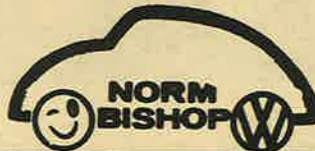
